RSL Sub-Branch - Threat of Closure.

Queenstown's RSL Sub-Branch will face the same fate as others in Tasmania and across Australia without community support.

Less than a dozen members attended the recent Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM) RSL chaired by Tasmania State President Mike Gallagher on February 22.

The purpose of the meeting was to approve changes to the Sub-Branch constitution and elect a new committee.

One important change to the constitution is an affiliate member can now be nominated as President. An Affiliate Member is a relative of an eligible League Member (living or deceased), serving and former first responders, State Correction Officers, Cadet Officers and Cadets.

Changes to the constitution were approved, but unfortunately, nobody volunteered to form the new committee. Without an active committee and new members, the Queenstown RSL Sub-Branch may soon lose its charter and be forced to close its doors.

It's also disappointing a former committee member is spreading false rumours in Queenstown. These lies serve

no constructive purpose except to insult veterans and ensure the community loses faith in the possibility of keeping an operational and sustainable sub-branch. The solution to this issue and the decisions for pathing a brighter future can only be made when a new committee is formed.

Despite playing a vital role, dwindling memberships have forced the closure of several RSL Sub-Branches in Tasmania in the past few years. Many, especially smaller branches, are struggling to maintain profitability and meet operating costs because of an ageing demographic and declining membership.

I urge ex-service personnel, first responders, people with a family history of service, and anyone passionate about preserving the legacy of veterans to join the Queenstown RSL Sub-Branch. The Sub-Branch can offer a welcoming atmosphere for members and guests, and if managed properly can continue to serve as a community hub, providing a comfortable space for veterans, their families and visitors to relax and socialise.

With a rich history of more than 80 years and a commitment to honouring service members, the Queenstown RSL Sub-Branch stands as a testament to the

town's heritage and community spirit. The next EGM is crucial to form a new committee and will be held at 1pm on April 12.

The Future of Queenstown RSL Sub Branch Inc

For more than 80 years, the Queenstown RSL Sub Branch Inc. has stood as a symbol of service, remembrance and community spirit. Today, it faces a critical moment, but also an opportunity for renewal.

An Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM) held on Sunday 22 February 2026 sought to elect a new President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. While 11 members attended, no nominations were received to fill the vacant executive positions.

RSL Tasmania State President Mike Gallagher, who chaired the meeting, acknowledged the disappointment but expressed confidence in the strength of the Queenstown community.

"Queenstown has always been defined by resilience," Mr Gallagher said. "The RSL here was built by veterans who believed in standing together. That same spirit can secure its future."

Mr Gallagher emphasised that a local RSL Sub Branch is not separate from its community, it is an extension of it. Without community involvement, a Sub Branch cannot exist. With it, it can thrive.

"Our Sub Branches are more than buildings," he said. "They are places where veterans connect, families find

support, and local history is preserved. When a community supports its RSL, it protects both its heritage and its future."

At the request of members present, a further Extraordinary General Meeting will be held on Sunday 12 April 2026, providing another opportunity for financial members to nominate for the vacant roles.

RSL Tasmania has made clear it does not wish to see Queenstown lose its Sub Branch and will provide support wherever possible. Chief Executive Officer John Hardy confirmed that members of the Social Connection Program will assist the Sub Branch in hosting a community "Coffee and Toastie" morning tea on Friday 10 April 2026.

The event will be open to members, veterans, families and the wider community, offering a chance to reconnect and recommit to the Sub Branch's future.

"This is a call to action," Mr Gallagher said. "If Queenstown values its RSL, now is the time to step forward."

RSL Tasmania encourages all veterans, ex-serving members and community supporters to attend the morning tea and the upcoming EGM and play a part in ensuring the Queenstown RSL continues to serve future generations.

Planned Burning Program 2026

What is a planned burn?

Planned burns are carried out by Sustainable Timber Tasmania to regenerate harvested forests, in a similar manner to the natural regeneration process that follows a bushfire. These burns also contribute to community safety by reducing fuel loads in Tasmania's public production forests.

How many burns are there?

This year, approximately 154 burns are planned across Permanent Timber Production Zone (PTPZ) land.

Why are planned burns undertaken in autumn?

Autumn provides the most suitable conditions for planned burns, with cooler temperatures and more stable weather patterns reducing the risk of fire escaping. It is also the ideal time to support the successful regeneration of eucalypt forests, with warm soil temperatures and the onset of seasonal rainfall promoting seedling growth.

What happens during a planned burn?

Sustainable Timber Tasmania carefully manages its Planned Burning Program to prioritise safety and minimise impacts on neighbours and local communities. Each burn is individually planned, with detailed consideration given to safety, weather and smoke dispersal, protection of assets and infrastructure, environmental values, and known local events. These factors are documented, reviewed, and approved, supported by individual risk assessments.

Planned burns are only undertaken when weather conditions are suitable for managing and containing the fire to the prepared boundaries.

How is smoke managed?

Sustainable Timber Tasmania coordinates its planned burns with other agencies and private forestry businesses with the aim to manage smoke levels in accordance with the Coordinated Smoke Management System.

Wherever possible, smoke dispersal is planned away from populated areas. Although smoke may be visible, it is usually travelling at height and impact to local communities is minimised.

On days when poor smoke dispersal is anticipated, burning is postponed until suitable weather conditions prevail.

How will I know when planned burns are happening?

Before any burns occur, Sustainable Timber Tasmania notifies and engages with immediate neighbours during the planning stage. Stakeholders who have registered interest in specific burns, including those in the wine and tourism industries, are also informed. Public advisories are shared with local media and posted to Sustainable Timber Tasmania's Facebook page twice daily. Additionally, updates and the full Planned Burning Program are available on the "What's Burning Now?" page at www.fire.tas.gov.au.

HOLI FESTIVAL = SO MUCH LOVE

A two thousand year old festival, clouds of colour, delicious spicy food and some of the happiest people you will ever meet, were all hallmarks of this year's Holi festival at Burnie Park recently.

Called the 'festival of colours', and having its roots in Nepalese and Hindu culture, Holi tells the story of the powerful demon king Hiranyakashipu, who demanded that everyone worship him as supreme. However, his son Prahlad remained a devoted follower of Lord Vishnu.

Angered by Prahlad's unwavering faith, Hiranyakashipu made several attempts to kill him. Prahlad was thrown from a cliff, trampled by elephants, poisoned, and even cast into a pit of snakes — yet each time he was miraculously protected by Lord Vishnu. His devotion remained firm despite these life-threatening trials. In one final attempt, Hiranyakashipu's sister Holika, who possessed a boon that made her immune to fire, sat with Prahlad on a burning pyre. But divine justice prevailed: Holika was consumed by the flames while Prahlad emerged unharmed. This event is com-

memorated as Holika Dahan, symbolising the destruction of evil and the protection of righteousness.

There is a lot more to the story and it is indeed a fascinating one but move to the modern day and the festival is all about love, friendship, faith and truth.

The recent Holi festival in Burnie Park showed just how much love is out there, 150 people gathered to throw coloured powders, squirt each other with water, eat some of the most delicious food I have tasted and laugh... A lot!

This was such a happy, colourful event and, even though I am not Nepalese, I was immediately welcomed into the festivities and felt the pride and love these people have for their culture.

If you get the chance to attend next year then do it, it doesn't matter what race, colour, religion or creed you may be. I guarantee you will be welcomed with open arms, end up with a full belly and most definitely leave covered in paint and with a huge smile.

Thank you so much to the Nepalese community for making me feel like an honorary Nepalese myself, I will most assuredly be at the next festival.

Hedley Faull Park Nearing Completion

The Hedley Faull Park redevelopment has seen pleasing momentum in recent weeks, with several key features now completed and more elements nearing the finish line. After significant delays, it's been great to finally see substantial progress on the ground.

Several major components have now been finalised, including:

- Basketball court sealing & line marking, improving playability and durability
- Concrete works at the Cutten Street entrance, enhancing access
- Rotunda roof and upright poles installed
- Stair rails fitted, improving safety and usability

In addition, Council's outdoor team has also spent time weeding and tidying areas throughout the park, helping to complete the final stages of the redevelopment. March will see the project entering its final stages, with the following items to be completed:

- Fence painting (internal and external)
- Replacement of guttering in key areas
- Installation of mobile fencing around the substation
- Mulch top-ups in garden beds and play areas

- Placement signage
- A new community mural, to be installed on the wall next to the BBQ area, commissioned by the Queenstown Lions Club
- General maintenance and finishing touches

The bike wash station is once again fully operational and already being used by riders.

Council is delighted to see community members already enjoying the completed areas of the park, even as finishing works continue. Community patience throughout this redevelopment has been greatly appreciated.

Planning is also underway for an official opening event, which will celebrate the transformation of this valued community space once all works are complete. Details will be announced once final timelines are confirmed.



Improved Accessibility at Swimming Pools

West Coast Council is committed to improving accessibility across all community facilities and both the Queenstown and Zeehan Pools are now equipped with accessible pool hoists to support community members with mobility needs.

The hoist at the Zeehan Pool was installed as part of the facility upgrade, whilst the Queenstown hoist was purchased recently through an Open Spaces Grant provided by the Tasmanian State Government & the Local Government Association of Tasmania.

Promoting and improving accessibility is a key priority for Council and is a guiding principle of the West Coast Health & Wellbeing Strategy 2025-2030.

Ensuring that community spaces can be used by everyone strengthens inclusion, participation, and wellbeing across the West Coast.

How to Access the Hoist

If a community member wishes to use a hoist at either pool, they can chat with pool staff on arrival. All staff are trained in the safe operation of the equipment and are available to assist.

Waterfront Project progressing

The Strahan Waterfront redevelopment continues to make strong progress, with the site now open and accessible to the public.

All on-site lighting is fully operational, providing improved visibility, safety, and amenity for community members and visitors enjoying the foreshore area. The only exception is the lighting in the new car park area, which will be connected once TasNetworks completes the final electrical works.

Another key milestone has been met, with the occupancy permit issued for the new toilets. Located on the Esplanade between The Ship That Never Was and the Huon Pine/Sawmill area, the toilets opened to the public on 26 February. The toilets will be open 7.15am-4.15pm, with the intention of installing the Unlock West Coast app for 24/7 access in the future. The portable toilets will remain in place in the short term.

Landscaping areas within the site have been roped off temporarily, with further works to be completed.

The Strahan Waterfront Advisory Committee has been meeting and working closely with Council to progress key elements of the project. The committee has provided valuable insight and local knowledge, helping shape important design and delivery decisions.

A community information session held on 19 February was also well attended. Attendees expressed strong support for the progress made to date and contributed feedback on several project components. This included:

- Adjustments to the height of the waterfront wall
- Input into preferred locations for the relocated fuel tanks
- General feedback on how the public will use and enjoy the revitalised area

Council appreciates the community's patience and thanks all community members who continue to engage constructively and help guide the project to ensure it meets local needs.

The Strahan Waterfront Project is a significant investment in enhancing public spaces, improving accessibility, and creating an inviting environment for locals and visitors to enjoy year-round.

Council Adopts Updated Privacy & Confidentiality Policy

West Coast Council has adopted its updated Privacy & Confidentiality Policy (WCC.022), strengthening Council's commitment to protecting personal information and managing confidential matters responsibly.

Council works daily with personal information from residents, staff, and businesses, and safeguarding that information is essential to maintaining community trust.

The policy recognises Council's regular work with sensitive material – including commercial negotiations, tenders, staff and legal matters, and personal hardship cases. The updated policy ensures:

- Personal information is collected only when necessary
- Information is used and stored securely
- Confidential Council matters remain protected
- Compliance with the Australian Privacy Principles and relevant legislation

These updates enhance existing safeguards and reflect modern privacy expectations.

If a community member believes their information has been mishandled, the policy outlines a process for lodging a complaint. The full policy is available on Council's website or by request.


90 years of MMG on show

In the early 1890s, following significant discoveries at Queenstown and Zeehan, prospectors moved into the Rosebery-Mt Read district in search of gold. A.J. Allom pegged a tourmaline lode on Mt Black in 1890, but the most important discovery came in 1893 when Tom McDonald uncovered gold in the alluvial wash of Rosebery Creek, and not just gold, but zinc-lead sulphide as well. He later established the Rosebery Prospecting Association, naming it after Lord Rosebery, the British Prime Minister at the time. The Rosebery Mine struggled with technical and financial difficulties due to the high zinc content of its ore, and operations ceased in 1913. Work recommenced in 1917, although progress was slow. In 1918, the Electrolytic Zinc Company of Australasia began pursuing control of the field, securing full ownership by the late 1920s. The township of

Rosebery began to take shape in 1928 with the construction of a new mill, which was completed in 1930. However, the Great Depression soon forced the operation into care and maintenance. Production resumed in February 1936 and has continued ever since, evolving over time into the modern operation it is today.

MMG Rosebery marked the milestone on 18 February 2026 with afternoon tea at the Rosebery Heritage Centre. During the celebration, visitors were able to view Tom McDonald's dollypot and book, which were displayed at the Centre for the occasion.

The Rosebery Heritage Centre is open from 10am-2pm, Monday to Friday on Agnes Street, Rosebery. Pop in and see what we have! Entry is by gold coin donation.

It safeguards drinking water quality and supports water-efficient systems that help us respond to a changing climate. In a rural and coastal community like ours, that protection is not optional - it's fundamental.

Plumbing also underpins daily life. From homes and schools to aged care facilities, sporting clubs and local businesses, reliable water and sanitation systems help people feel safe, supported and connected. They are essential infrastructure for a community that wants to grow sustainably and remain a great place to live.

Importantly, plumbing is also about people and opportunity.

Through the work of the Circular Head Education and Training Consultative Committee (CHETCC), Council continues to champion education and skills pathways at every stage of life. Established in 1999, CHETCC brings together schools, training providers, industry and local government to strengthen learning and employment opportunities across the region.

Trades like plumbing offer practical, rewarding careers that support both individuals and the broader community. As highlighted in the accompanying TasTAFE story, pathways such as the Certificate II in Plumbing give learners, whether school leavers or career changers, the chance to explore the industry, develop real-world skills and build connections with local employers.

Strong training partnerships matter. They create local apprenticeships, support businesses and ensure our region has the skilled workforce needed to maintain and improve essential infrastructure.

A Day in the Life: Protecting What We Don't Always See

Before taps are turned on in a new home or business, careful work is already underway.

Our Council Plumbing Compliance Officer spends the day answering questions from residents, builders and plumbers, reviewing permit applications, and ensuring plans meet the Building Act and national plumbing regulations. It's detailed work - but it protects drinking water, keeps wastewater out of our rivers and coastline, and ensures systems are built to last.

With usually three inspections per permit, on-site checks confirm that pipes, drainage and connections are installed safely and correctly. Research, compliance audits and collaboration across Council departments all help maintain high standards across the region.

It might not always be visible, but this role underpins healthy homes, thriving local businesses and clean waterways - helping Circular Head grow confidently and sustainably.

Life extension update

We have made an application to the Federal Government to determine if approval is required - under the EPBC Act - for the proposed development of a potential tailings storage facility (TSF) at Exe.

Exe is one of several locations under consideration as part of our long-term planning for Rosebery.

This is the first stage of the environmental assessment process.

Over the coming year, we will work with Government to ensure we prepare a comprehensive Environmental Impact Statement (EIS).

Minister visits Rosebery

MMG Rosebery was pleased to welcome Federal Minister for Resources Madeleine King and Federal Member for Braddon Anne Urquhart to site last month for an update on our operations.

We highlighted our importance to the Tasmanian economy including that our zinc concentrate is a significant proportion of feed for the Nystar smelter in Hobart and that we are an important royalty payer to the state government.

We also discussed how we are unlocking Rosebery's full potential and our work to extend current tailings facilities to support the life extension project and TSF3.

Under The Horizontal *with Tewkesbury Wharf*


By the advent of 1882, the Mount Heemskirk tin field was going gang-busters. Almost everyone was convinced that the recently discovered tin lodes would be richer than the Mount Bischoff mine. The old North Heemskirk claims, abandoned in 1879, were being revived and new sections pegged in the frenzy of 1881. The premier claim at the north end was once again Glenora, high up on the Tasman River.

At the time there were 200 men at Mount Heemskirk and a fair proportion of them at North Heemskirk, which started to cause logistics problems. To access Trail Harbour or the post office at the Montagu claim, they had to cross the pinch at The Gap a notorious

and often dangerous exercise with a heavy load.

On the 16th of February 1882, Fred Milne wrote to the Mercury complaining about the mail situation, that of having to collect their mail from South Heemskirk, ten miles distant, when the mailman came through North Heemskirk from Corinna on the mail run. He

also suggested that a harbour, discovered by John Foster six miles north-west of the Glenora claim, be used to facilitate delivery of machinery for

the North Heemskirk claims.

He was advised to inspect the harbour with Charles Sprent to assess its potential, but Sprent was waylaid and Milne visited alone and made a sketch. He visited again in mid-March with Sprent's assistant Mr Henwood and a Mr Burke to get a proper survey and it was found to have potential for moorings and a

small jetty. A deputation was made to the Minister of Lands and Works, C. O'Reilly, then on an inspection tour of the West Coast, regarding the

harbour and improving the track to Trial Harbour. Mr O'Reilly's associate, Mr Snowden had broken his leg in a fall at The Gap only a few days previously.


In late March, the newspapers were already calling it Milne Harbour and considered it a *fait accompli*. Sprent was instructed to make an inspection and reported on the 14th of April

that it had potential, but without a boat could not ascertain depths. Meanwhile, the decision was made to establish a post office at the Glenora claim to alleviate the mail situation. The harbour then began to be referred to as Glenora Harbour.

At the beginning of August, parliament authorised a survey and on 21st of August, Captain John Reid aboard the s.s. Amy entered Glenora Harbour to take soundings. He reported it to be a superior harbour to Trial Harbour. Around this time the Postmaster General changed the name of Glenora to Granville to avoid confusion with the village near Bushy Park. By early September it was recommended that moor-

ings be laid and a road constructed from the harbour to the Granville Post Office at the Glenora claim.

On the 22nd of October 1882, the Amy entered Granville Harbour and Mr Gourlay and assistant, Mr Donaldson, disembarked to set up the first store at Granville Harbour, and became its first residents.

Burnie Park Walking Track Upgrade Completed

As part of Council's Active Transport Strategy, Council have upgraded the existing asphalt footpath at Burnie Park - widening it to 3 metres to create a safer, more accessible space for everyone to enjoy.

The Active Transport Strategy was made possible thanks to a \$200,000 grant from the Tasmanian State Government through the Better Active Transport Program, along with a \$50,000 contribution from Council to deliver the strategy document.

With approximately \$125,000 remaining after the document strategy was completed, Council were able to reinvest those funds directly back into our community - upgrading the popular walking track at Burnie Park.

And this is just the beginning! Further development and implementation of the Active Transport Strategy is planned as part of Council's 2026-27 Capital Works Program.

We look forward to seeing our community out walking, running, and enjoying the improved track!

Road Survey across the Burnie Municipality

Burnie City Council engaged with the team at Infrastructure Management Group (IMG) to assist Council with taking a closer look at the condition of our roads, footpaths, and kerbs.

What was assessed:

- 299.3 km of sealed road and kerb
- 45.6 km of unsealed road
- 201.9 km of footpath
- 14.02 km of state roads (council kerb only)

Using the best available technology, the team captured detailed, objective data that will directly assist Council to prioritise maintenance, plan long-term funding, and ensure ratepayer dollars are spent where they have the greatest impact - preventing bigger, more costly repairs down the track.

The Infrastructure Management Group (IMG) have completed the physical road and footpath survey, and are compiling the report for Council.



- Police have 24/7 access, helping operations run smoothly when incidents occur


Community-Wide Improvements

West Australian Gulgawarnigu exhibition heading to Tassie



Gulgawarnigu — an extraordinary exhibition of digital portraits and landscapes created by young artists from Roebourne, Western Australia — comes to North West Tasmania this March for two special community events.

Developed through the Digital Lab in Roebourne in partnership with NEO-Learning, Gulgawarnigu began as part of an exhibition at the National Portrait Gallery in Canberra and has since grown into a touring project celebrating the creative voices of remote Indigenous artists and communities. The project is presented by Big hART, one of Australia's most acclaimed arts organisations working at the intersection of art and social change.

The artworks; striking portraiture and landscapes created by the young artists of Roebourne are accompanied by digital art workshops, giving local community members the opportunity to explore digital creative tools and skills of their own.

"This project is about making sure that powerful art made in remote Australia gets seen widely, and that digital skills and storytelling reach communities that might otherwise miss out," said producer Mark Leahy.

About Gulgawarnigu

Gulgawarnigu has toured widely since its origins in the National Portrait Gallery, with pop-up exhibitions and workshops held in Wallaga Lake NSW, North West Tasmania, Karratha WA, and Bunbury WA. In 2025 the artworks were celebrated in a homecoming exhibition at Ngurin Cultural Centre in Roebourne, where artists Patrick Churnside, Isaac and Kenton Walker shared their experiences of bringing work from Country to Canberra and back again.

The project is committed to supporting regional and remote artists, promoting digital literacy, and ensuring that communities everywhere have access to the skills and tools of digital creativity.

Big hART is an Australian arts organisation that uses high-quality creative projects to address social disadvantage, working alongside communities to create meaningful change. Big hART has delivered projects across Australia for more than 25 years.

A community working together

Circular Head Council, in partnership with the Soroptimist International of Circular Head, hosted a special International Women's Day breakfast recently, bringing members of the community together to celebrate the achievements of local women and reflect on the work still to be done.

Guests enjoyed a hot breakfast while listening to inspiring speakers and stories that highlighted the power of communities working together for positive change. This year's International Women's Day theme, "Balance the Scales," focuses on the urgent need for fair, inclusive and accessible justice for women and girls. While progress has been made over the decades, many barriers still remain when it comes to safety, equality and access to services.

Guest speakers Dr Natasha Vavrek, Director of The Bubble Tasmania – Women's Health Clinic, and Kristen Wylie, Director of Tasmania Legal Aid, challenged the audience to think about what balancing the scales looks like in our everyday lives. Dr Vavrek spoke about the ongoing imbalance in women's healthcare. Despite progress, much of the healthcare system has historically been designed around male experiences, meaning women's health issues have often been overlooked or under-resourced. She also highlighted the additional barriers faced by women living in regional communities, where access to specialised care can depend heavily on where you live.

Kristen Wylie spoke about another area where the scales remain far from balanced - genderbased violence and misogyny. She highlighted the confronting reality that violence against women remains a serious and ongoing issue in Australia. Together their message was clear - if the scales are going to balance, communities need to keep speaking up

and advocating for change.

A highlight of the morning was also a local story that reflected the spirit of the day - a story about listening to the community and working together to remove barriers for women. Circular Head Council's Access to Health Services Support Officer shared how conversations with local women revealed a clear need for better access to women's health services in the region.

While exploring options, it was discovered that local doctor Dr Jane Edwards had begun gaining the qualifications needed to run women's health clinics locally and had staff willing to support the service. The missing piece was a specialised gynaecology examination bed.

Through collaboration between Council, the Circular Head Soroptimists and other supporters, funding was secured for the bed, which is now housed at Ochre Medical Centre in Smithton, with women's health clinics already underway.

The project was made possible with support from Premier Jeremy Rockliff, who funded the purchase of the bed, McCain Foods, who covered the freight costs, and Ochre Medical, Dr Edwards and clinic staff who are delivering the service.

While simple in concept, the impact will be significant. Local women can now access services such as contraception, cervical screening and peri-menopause and menopause care closer to home.

Announcing the initiative on International Women's Day was a fitting reminder that when communities listen, connect and work together, real progress can be made.



Church Street, Stanley Master Plan – Works to Begin

Council is about to start work on the first stage of the Church Street Master Plan. This plan was shaped by community feedback over the past few years, with residents asking for a safer, more walkable main street.

Stage One focuses on addressing the long-standing safety concerns at the Wharf end of Church Street.

The current layout creates safety risks for drivers and pedestrians. To fix this, we will:

- Close the Church Street and Wharf Road junction
- Change Church Street to one-way traffic heading north
- Extend the footpath to make walking safer and easier

These changes will:

- Mean fewer tricky spots for drivers
- Make traffic flow simpler and safer
- Improve pedestrian access
- Deliver the first step in the community’s long-term vision for Church Street

Works are expected to take 4–6 weeks and start dates will be provided shortly.

Tales from Emmerton Park - meet the residents

My Story – Dean Ollington



I was born at our family home in Scotchtown. Nurse Bates, a well-known icon of the district and a great friend of Mum's, delivered me. We lived on our 365-acre farm, where we milked cows. We started out with 30 cows but eventually grew to 130. My parents worked hard to provide for us. Money was often

I had five brothers and five sisters, sadly only Audrey and Lynette are still with us. We had a lot of fun growing up and got into our fair share of mischief. I remember one time I accidentally put the crosscut saw through a window. I can still feel that one! I could never imagine growing up

tight, but we always had what we needed.

I didn't start talking until I was five years old—the doctor said I was simply too lazy to talk. The first time I spoke was to our neighbour, and she claimed I swore at her! After that, I came right.

I went to Smithton Primary School and later to Smithton High. For the first five years, I never missed a day of school. Then, when I was eleven, I got appendicitis, which broke my perfect attendance streak. I left school at fifteen and worked on the family farm for my keep. I did a lot of hard work on that farm.

anywhere else. Circular Head was the best place in the world.

My parents were Christians, and we attended the Brethren Church on the corner of King and Emmett Streets in Smithton. I went to Sunday School for thirteen years and didn't miss a single Sunday.

When I turned twenty-one, I moved to Warragul in Victoria and got a job at the Drouin Milk Factory, working on the milk separator. The milk came in cans back then. I was happy to be earning fifteen pounds a week. I boarded with a fellow named Ray Marshall. When I wasn't working, I helped Ray milk 120 cows in a steel herringbone dairy, it was the best. I stayed in Victoria for two years before returning home, back to the place I loved.

After returning to the family farm, I decided to build a herringbone dairy for Dad. I bought enough steel to make it and asked Alva Marthick to help me with the welding. It made life a whole lot easier.

1962 was the best year of my life because that's when I met my wife, Peggy. She was from New Zealand and had just returned from watching the Commonwealth Games in Perth with her friends.

They decided to visit family who lived next door to our farm, lucky for me! When they returned to New Zealand, Peggy stayed behind and got a job at Ambroses in Smithton.

Peggy and I were married in 1964, we were a great pair. We worked on a farm in Trowutta, milking cows for twelve

months, and started our family there. Our first three children arrived close together, and then, seven years later, Alistair came along. Over those years, we worked on farms in Alcomie, Trowutta, and Scopus before finally settling in Togari on our own 220 acres farm. We stayed there for nine years before giving the cows away and moving to Edith Creek.

Over the years, I developed a love for breeding and training quarter horses. I broke them in myself and spent countless hours with them. I remember moving a cow and calf at Robbins Island one day with my horse Sam McCloud (Paddy), he took control and did the job perfectly on his own. He was something special.

The last job I had was fencing at Woolnorth. It was the kind of job that was never truly finished. I didn't think I'd enjoy it, but I stayed for ten years and finally retired at sixty-eight. During that time, I also served as a pastor at the Presbyterian Church in Stanley, where I made many lifelong friends.

After turning eighty, Peggy and I retired to Somerset, where we enjoyed living for four years. Later, when two places became available at Emmerton Park, we finally had the chance to return home. It was the best move we ever made.

Looking back, I feel proud of the life I've lived. I've known hard work, love, loss, and joy. Most of all, I'm grateful for the people who have walked beside me on this journey, especially Peggy.


provide the services we do without dedicated volunteers like Brett.

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





Rides for little kids and big kids were also very popular as was the colour run around the skate park.


The day finished with a fabulous lantern parade and of course the fireworks to ooh and aah over.

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
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WYNYARD YACHT CLUB

The Wynyard Yacht Club (WYC) was formed in 1961 in a clubhouse nearby the existing.

As membership grew the clubhouse built by volunteer labour extended three times.

In 2015 the opportunity arose to partner with the Waratah Wynyard Council (WWC) to build the current clubhouse that was eventually opened in 2023.

WYC has a long term lease with the WCC and has a community focus where all people are catered for in an respectful, inclusive, safe environment.

WYC has a number of boating groups that use the clubhouse.

Marine Rescue operates from the facility and is aligned with Surf lifesaving Tasmania to deliver this service to the community.

Sailability is a program that provides opportunities for those with a disability or aged to get on the water

WYC Paddling group, aligned with Paddle Tasmania, operate from the facility during winter months while sailing operates during summer providing a full year of facility use.

WYC is an accredited Australian Sailing Centre that delivers training to the public through its junior Tackers and Youth / Adult Learn to Sail programs.

Saturday sailing program occurs weekly from October through till April with a

qualified Coach watching over the programs safety and learning.

WYC is also a Marine and Safety Tasmania (MAST) powerboat licence provider running monthly licence programs.

WYC has a large amount of equipment made available for members use. This allows community to try without the need to purchase a boat themselves.

WYC hosted three major events this year.

In January 2026 WYC hosted the International Mirror Class Australian Championships. Ideal weather over the five days of competition allowing the 50 competitors and 30 volunteers

In late February WYC was the finish for the 10th edition of Gone Nuts 101 Adventure Run with 980 registrations.

April 2026 WYC in partnership with Burnie Surf Lifesaving Club will host the Australian Ocean Racing Championships. Planning is well underway with 120 plus expected to register

The WYC facility is available for community use with large downstairs area plus meeting rooms upstairs.

Since launching in 2021, OVERLAP Consistent Running Coaching has become a growing part of the Northwest Tasmanian running scene, offering both personalised coaching and a strong sense of community.

Founded by Zac Harris, OVERLAP was built on a simple idea: help people discover the joy of running through consistency, connection, and a sustainable approach to training. As Founder and Head Coach, Zac says the focus has always been on making running feel accessible and enjoyable.

“Running should add to your life, not take away from it,” Zac said. “We take a holistic approach, with a strong focus on feel-based training and consistency, so people can build a positive and lasting relationship with running.”

OVERLAP now has a team of seven coaches, each bringing their own knowledge, experience, and coaching style. That variety allows the service to sup-

port a wide range of runners, from complete beginners through to experienced athletes chasing new goals.

The business offers 1:1 online coaching, along with regular group training sessions at 6am on Tuesdays in Ulverstone and 6pm on Thursdays in Wynyard.

Beyond formal coaching, OVERLAP and its team also facilitate several free weekly run and walk clubs across the Northwest, helping create welcoming spaces for people to move, socialise, and connect. These include The Pier Pub Run in Ulverstone, The Pub Run in Devonport, Sunday Penguins in Penguin, and The Coffee Run and The Beer Run in Stanley.

Over the past five years, OVERLAP has coached hundreds of people and has also played a role in helping bring running events to the region. 

Review to ensure a strong freight future moving forward

Federal Assistant Minister for Regional Development, Senator Anthony Chisholm, has visited Tasmanian producers, farmers and manufacturers this week as the government's review into the Tasmanian Freight Equalisation Scheme continues.

Senator Chisholm has met with businesses across Tasmania's diverse economy, including the Boyer Paper Mill, Pure Foods Tasmania, BioMar and Fruit Growers Tasmania. TFES financially supports Tasmanian freight, including the state's world-class produce, and passengers to cross the Bass Strait.

Since July 2025, Tasmanian businesses have already been benefitting from a 25 per cent increase in assistance rates under the scheme — putting more money in their back pockets at a time it's needed most. The Albanese Labor Government is providing this additional \$95 million to increase assistance for Tassie producers, and an independent review of the scheme. The review will consider if TFES could better support local businesses, including farmers and producers, to compete in domestic and other markets.

The review is being carried out by independent reviewers Dr David Parmeter and Dr Jenny Gordon.

Collectively, the TFES and Bass Strait have delivered more than \$6

billion to Tasmanian businesses since their introduction in 1976 and 1996 respectively. A final review report and recommendations to the government are expected in the first half of 2026.

Assistant Minister for Regional Development Senators said "It's been a really insightful few days meeting with Tassie farmers and businesses and hearing about the issues that matter to them.

"It's clear they all share a passion for sharing Tasmania's premium produce with the mainland and the world.

"Tasmanian businesses rightly deserve a level playing field when it comes to sending their produce overseas, but also when it comes to importing goods to maintain their business at home.

"This review is all about ensuring the TFES continues to deliver tangible benefits for Tasmanian businesses and sustains them for many years to come."

Member for Braddon Anne Urquhart said "For the community of Braddon, freight isn't just a business cost it's a lifeline. From our farmers and manufacturers on the Northwest Coast to producers on King Island, the Tasmanian Freight Equalisation Scheme plays a critical role in keeping local industries competitive and jobs secure.

On King Island in particular, where isolation adds another layer of cost and complexity, getting freight settings right is essential. Whether it's moving world-class mbeef and dairy to mainland markets or bringing essential goods back to the island, TFES must properly recognise the unique challenges our island and regional communities face.

This review is about making sure the scheme works as intended delivering real support to Braddon businesses, strengthening regional supply chains and backing the communities that power Tasmania's economy."



Tales from a Zeehan graveyard

MAN SUFFERS HEART ATTACK AFTER FILLING MINING TRUCK WITH MULLOCK



A very sudden death occurred in the north drive, No. 7 level, at the South Spray Mine about 1:00 a.m. on Friday, 7 August 1908 when James O'Neil collapsed after filling a mining truck with waste rock. When his working mate James Lonergan went over to check he found O'Neil was already dead.

The next day a Coronial Enquiry was held at the Caledonian Hotel at 10:00 a.m. before Coroner E.W. Turner. It was somewhat unusual as it was convened to enquire into two separate deaths, James O'Neil being one, and Horace Sherrin the other. Sherrin (17) had been badly injured at the Smelters on the previous Thursday after getting caught up in machinery, and he had died the day after O'Neil. The Enquiry into his death was heard on

the following Monday.

The first witness was Dr. Gilbert Edward Butler, who deposed that at 1:40 a.m. on the night in question he had been called to the Spray Mine by a messenger. He proceeded there with Constable Mathews and Mr A.D. Sligo. On arrival he saw the body of deceased and found life to be extinct. There was a slight abrasion over the right eye. In company with Mr T.H. Vincent (mine manager) and James Lonergan he descended to where the deceased had been working, and found a splash of blood on the wall about [1.5 metres] from the face of the drive, and a hat was lying nearby. The air was quite good, and there were no signs of any earth having fallen. Lonergan picked at the face, and it was quite sound.

He had made a post-mortem examination, and found an old injury to the right eye, and just above that was a recent wound from which blood had exuded. He saw that the heart was largely degenerated by fat, being about twice its normal size, and filled with a large clot of blood. He found no traces of any other disease. He believed that the condition of the heart was likely to cause death at any time should there be any undue exertion.

The next witness called was George Brown, a miner, who deposed he had known deceased for about four months, and during that time they had often worked together. He had not heard

O'Neil complain of any illness. He last saw deceased alive on the night of the sixth of August at about 9:40 p.m. at Buckley's Hotel, when he was talking to Mr Howard, a contractor at the Spray Mine, who had asked deceased to work a shift for him, and O'Neil had agreed. A little later deceased stated he was going to his daughter's to change and then go to work at midnight. He then seemed to be in good health.

Son of deceased, George, stated his father was born in Cheshire, England, and he was 61 years of age. He had last seen his father alive about 10:00 p.m. on the night of the sixth of August, when he appeared to be in good health and spirits. He had never heard his father complain of any illness, ex-

cept about his back if he had done any heavy lifting.

John Lonergan, working mate of the deceased, said he had gone below at about 12:10 a.m. with O'Neil, and they went to the face on Number 7 level, where he filled a truck and deceased partly filled another truck. He was preparing a hole when he heard deceased fall down behind him. He immediately went over to O'Neil, who didn't answer him, and when he lifted him up witness thought he was already dead. He then went and found two more men, and they carried O'Neil's body to the surface.

He added he had been working in the same place for three weeks, and had always found the air good. Deceased had said nothing about feeling unwell, and seemed in the best of spirits. He had known deceased about thirty years, and was on the best of terms with him. In answer to a question he stated he had pushed the first truck out alone and all deceased had done was to partly fill a truck.

Constable John Mathews deposed he had accompanied Dr. Butler to the Spray Mine and took charge of James O'Neil's body.

The jury, without retiring, brought in a verdict that deceased had died from natural causes.

His funeral left for the Cemetery from the Zeehan and Dundas Hospital on Sunday, 9 August at 3:30 p.m. It is known where he was buried but today no physical trace remains. This is an abridged excerpt taken from books edited by Malcolm Ready, *Burials at the Zeehan General (Pioneer) Cemetery*.

The new Burnie Medicare Urgent Care Clinic, located at 16-20 Mooreville Road, Park Grove, is now open extended hours, seven days a week.

No appointment is needed, patients can walk in and all services are bulk billed.

The highly trained doctors and nurses are equipped to treat a range of conditions and injuries that need urgent attention but aren't life threatening, including cuts, viral infections, or a sprained ankle.

The Burnie Medicare Urgent Care Clinic will ease pressure on the busy Northwest Regional Hospital, where around 40 per cent of presentations in 2024-25 were for semi-urgent or non-urgent conditions.

The clinic will join the existing network of six Medicare Urgent Care Clinics across Tasmania, with a further clinic to commence operation in Kingston over the coming months.

This is part of the Albanese Govern-

ment's commitment to deliver more Medicare Urgent Care Clinics across the country with 4 out of 5 Australians to live within a 20-minute drive from their

local clinic. Labor's Medicare Urgent Care Clinics have already seen more than 2.4 million presentations since the first sites opened in June 2023, including over 142,100 presentations to Tasmanian Medicare Urgent Care Clinics.

One in four of these were patients aged under 15 years old, more than one in four were on weekends, and over one in three were weekday after hours visits (at or after 5pm).

The Burnie Medicare Urgent Care Clinic is commissioned by the Tasmanian Primary Health Network.

Minister Butler said "The Burnie Medicare Urgent Care Clinic is a game changer for families in the region." "The Burnie Medicare Urgent Care Clinic will ease pressure on the emergency department at

the North West Regional Hospital and free up staff to provide care to people with more serious conditions.

"This clinic is a key part of the Albanese Government's commitment to strengthen Medicare and make health care more accessible and affordable."

Anne Urquhart MP, Member for Braddon went on to say

"For people in Burnie and the surrounding community, this Medicare Urgent clinic will make a real difference, by offering accessible, bulk-billed urgent care right here in the heart of Burnie."

"It means families can get the care they need, when they need it, without added cost or long travel."

"Opening the urgent Care Clinic is a big positive for the Burnie community, easing pressure on the Northwest Regional Hospital and strengthening local health services."
